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EPA's POWER PLAN

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Electricity prices are projected to increase significantly for Louisiana under the Power Plan.

15% average increase for mass-based compliance

11% average increase for rate-based compliance

EPA's Power Plan will have no effect on climate change


- CO₂ concentrations will be reduced by 0.2%
- Global average temperature rise will be reduced by 0.013 °C (1/80th of a degree)
- Sea level rise will be reduced by 0.2 millimeter (the thickness of two sheets of paper)




Five reasons why states should put their pencils down

- 1. The Power Plan could be overturned by SCOTUS in 2018**
- 2. The Power Plan could be withdrawn by the next POTUS in 2017**
- 3. Plans not likely due until 2021 ... 5 years from now**
- 4. Waste of state resources**
- 5. Could undermine states' legal credibility**

So far, a total of 28 states (green) have put their pencils down



The timeline below illustrates new deadlines (green) even if SCOTUS upholds the CPP in June 2018. However, it is also possible that SCOTUS will overturn the CPP.



Major Milestones

- Supreme Court stays Power Plan February 2016
- D.C. Circuit decision (best guess) Fall 2016
- Elections November 2016
- New President and Congress January 2017
- Supreme Court decision (best guess) June 2018
- Implementation plan due to EPA (best guess) January 2021
